What has happened to our pond?

Following reports that the pond behind the Miners' Club had been drained we looked into the matter.

It seems that a digger from the nearby building site went onto the land and dug out a drainage trench. We also discovered that Cala Homes are responsible for the potential development of the site.

We contacted Cala Homes. Their land engineer did not know of any works on the land. We reminded them that the area including the pond has, as part of the development plan, to be subject to a full ecological survey given that rare or endangered species may inhabit the area.

The Cala Homes engineer undertook to look into the matter. We are waiting for further information.

Save Our Sparrow



The common sparrow, which was once an everyday sight in Scotland, has become - almost - rare. According to the RSPB, sparrow numbers have declined by 90% since the 1970's. In an effort to stop the disappearance of this little bird, the RSPB has joined with Glasgow Council to plant wildflowers in open spaces across the city.

Everyone can help support these iconic birds and other similar birds by planting seed-rich flowers in their gardens like linseed, sunflowers, cornflowers and white campion.
